ANNEX II

Requirements for the recognition of foreign COVID-19 vaccination certificates

As of 1 July 2021 the Netherlands will accept a COVID-19 vaccination certificate as a replacement for the test certificate. A COVID-19 vaccination certificate is only necessary when travelling (back) to the Netherlands in the case of a traveler leaving a country with high-risk of COVID-19 (a country designated with an "orange" travel advice by the Dutch authorities). In case the traveler is not in possession of a vaccination certificate, a negative test or recovery certificate is obligatory. The recovery certificate is only accepted in case the traveler has received this certificate from competent health authorities from an EU-country.

The Netherlands will accept certificates issued within the framework of the EU Digital COVID Certificate (DCC) and other COVID-19 vaccination certificates (issued by competent authorities within a third country) that includes the following data:

- Full name of vaccinated person
- Target illness: SARS-CoV-2 or any of its variants
- COVID-19 vaccine or prophylaxis approved by EMA or stated on the WHO Emergency Listing
- Product name of the COVID-19 vaccine
- Marketing authorization holder or producer of the COVID-19 vaccine
- Date of vaccination, indicating the date of each dose
- Member State or third country in which the vaccine was administered
- Issuer of the certificate
- In one of the languages: English, German, French, Portuguese, Italian, Spanish
- Signature or security stamp of the issuer of the certificate

The vaccination certificate must show that the traveler has been fully vaccinated, i.e. the traveler:

- Has received two doses of a vaccine requiring two doses, or
- Has received one dose of a vaccine requiring one dose, or
- One dose has been received from a vaccine that requires two doses, after having previously been infected with SARS-CoV-2.

COVID-19 vaccination certificates which are in accordance with the above mentioned requirements, will be accepted by the competent authorities in the Netherlands.
